A Women's Lectionary for the Whole Church

Over a year ago Erwin Barron, our parish associate, sent me information about a new resource: A Women's Lectionary for the Whole Church by Wilda Gafney, the Hulsey Professor of Hebrew Bible at Brite Divinity School, Texas Christian University. Erwin and I have been preaching the same lectionary scriptures for over 30 years, so this sounded exciting. We are using it this Advent! Gafney sets new combinations of the readings to refocus preaching and shift the conversation of the lectionary reading. She hopes to put spark in the hearts and minds of congregations with new issues regarding gender, who is out and who is in, and the gulf between more equitable practices for women and how the Church has tended to operate otherwise. Gafney pulls out the stories of those around the edges that don't come up in our yearly readings in the Revised Common Lectionary. This Advent, for example, focuses on the surprising ways God works in the lives of God's people-way back then and also now! —Pastor Maggi Henderson
