New Artwork, New Preaching Series

Today is the last day the kelp forest banners by San Francisco artist Josie Iselin will hang in the church. Iselin is the co-director of Above/Below, a collaborative working to bring the recognition afforded the forests on land to the kelp forests below the ocean's surface.

The Worship Committee is creating new artwork for the reredos (wall behind the choir) to follow the kelp forest banners. Those banners inspired us to think about all the ways the oceans and aquatic life are featured in the biblical story. The aquatic theme will continue with a school of fish swimming across the reredos. Our fish will be varied and colorful, much like our congregation and our community.

Why fish? Fishing people were the first people Jesus called as disciples. Jesus fed a multitude with just a few fish, and water was often the place where his greatest teachings took place. Water was a place of rest and renewal for Jesus. Early Christians adopted the fish as a symbol of their faith. Further, the Greek word for fish, $IX\ThetaY\Sigma$ (ichthys), was used by early Christians as an acronym for the phrase *Jesus Christ, Son of God, Savior*. Many folks helped create the fish last week.

Starting Sunday, August 20, and continuing through September, Pastor Maggi will preach a series of sermons focusing how bodies of water were the place of many of Jesus' teachings and how these stories can still offer us a place of learning today. She hopes the sermon series doesn't *make waves* but goes along *swimmingly*.

"Thanks!" from the Illini 4000

The Illini 4000 extend their thanks to Old First for staying the night in the fellowship hall last night. The Illini 4000 is a non-profit organization dedicated to documenting the American cancer experience through *The Portraits Project*, raising funds for cancer research and patient support services, as well as spreading awareness for the fight against cancer through annual cross-country bike rides. Every year, a team of students cycle across America to collect portraits and raise money for cancer research and patient support services. Yesterday seventeen University of Illinois student cyclists completed their ride from New York to San Francisco, and several of them rested well under Old First's roof last night. The Illini 4000 have stayed at Old First three times before – 2017, 2018, and 2019 – but this was their first time back at Old First since the Covid-19 pandemic.
