## MAGGI'S MUSINGS

Pentecost is a Jewish holy day that celebrated a harvest – that of the first fruits – and also God's gift of the law through Moses on Mt. Sinai. The community did not work on that day and gave thanks to God for both harvest and law.

On Pentecost, Christians remember God's gift of the Holy Spirit, who came upon the disciples that day with the sound of a mighty wind. Tongues of fire appeared on the disciples and they began to speak in other dialects so that all who were gathered in Jerusalem that day could hear the Good News of Jesus Christ in their own language. Peter spoke quoting Joel 2:28-29, and the New Testament tells us that 3,000 people became believers. Read the story in the Acts of the Apostles, Chapters 1 and 2.

We also commemorate Pentecost as the birthday of the church, and explore and give thanks for the variety of gifts and expressions of our faith that the Spirit gives us and that we bring to the church.

We will celebrate Pentecost on Sunday, June 12. The worship committee invited members of the church to come together in May to plan the day and they are incorporating the elements of wind, fire and water into the service. You are encouraged to wear red to the service. Red is the color symbolic of the Holy Spirit. I leave you with a poem by Walter Brueggemann. Peace, Pastor Maggi

We name you wind, power, force and then, imaginatively, "Third Person." We name you and you blow... blow hard, blow cold. blow hot, blow strong, blow gentle, blow new... So blow this day, wind, blow here and there, power, blow even us, force, Rush us beyond ourselves, rush us beyond our hopes, rush us beyond our fears, until we enact your newness in the world. #### Changes in PCUSA Constitution

## Amendment 10A

Over thirty years ago, the Presbyterian Church adopted a "definitive guidance" which prohibited "practicing" gay and lesbian persons from ordination as pastors, elders or deacons. Last month, Presbyterians ended those thirty years of oppression! In May, the Presbytery of the Twin Cities became the 87th presbytery to affirm Amendment 10A, which eliminated the ban on ordaining gay men and lesbians in the church's Book of Order. Thus a majority of presbyteries across the nation have affirmed the amendment, as is required to change the Book of Order. The change will go into effect in June, after all the presbyteries have finished voting. In the meantime, we celebrate that God is continuing to work in the Presbyterian Church.

The Presbyterian Church USA now joins the United Church of Christ, the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, and Episcopal Church in explicitly allowing local governing bodies to decide whether to ordain gay, lesbian, and transgender people. Especially gratifying is that Presbyterians made this decision by local presbyteries, small and large across the country, agreeing to this change. Local groups of Presbyterians in Alabama, Tennessee, and many other unexpected places across the country changed their votes from past years and now support local decisions about gay and lesbian ordination.

Old First Presbyterian Church has had a substantial role in this process. Former pastor Tim Hart-Anderson and others began the Covenant Network of Presbyterians, and Elder Pam Byers, who led the organization through most of this time, was very instrumental in changing hearts and minds across the country.

#### **BECOMING A COMMISSIONED LAY PASTOR**

Since finishing my PhD, my faith has felt dry, lacking in heart. After trying futilely to reenergize my faith in a number of different ways, I reached the conclusion that it wasn't my faith that was lacking but ways to express my faith actively in community. Retired life is very fulfilling: lots of travel, a book contract, and discovering the "diva" within in musical theater. Part of me thinks I am absolutely crazy to try to fit one more thing into my life. But recovering a dynamic, growing faith is just too important for me to ignore. I need to risk moving out of my comfort zone. Recently, I enjoyed my experience on the Committee on Ministry most when working with congregations in transition. That seems a good fit with my interests in visioning, creating healing community and effective organizational structures. I began to envision working as a consultant/trouble shooter, helping congregations identify issues confronting them and bringing an outside perspective and resources to explore their creative potential for ministry. I am also interested in empowering people's faith development by helping to make scripture relevant to daily lives, especially when they are in the midst of change.

I began conversations with Keenan Kelsey and the Noe Valley Session about working with them in their transition to worshiping at St. Luke's hospital while their church is being renovated. When the Session said they would want me to come as a "pastoral presence," I almost burst into tears. It was as if they could read my heart. Being recognized as a "pastoral presence" is the one thing that I have felt called to that has been missing for much of my life. I came under care of Presbytery 34 years ago and have struggled ever since to find a place in the structure of the institutional church that would allow me to be this. Finally the role of Commissioned Lay Pastor provides a way to define that kind of relationship with Noe Valley.

I will attend Session meetings as a resource person and to advise on organizational structures to support Christian Education, deacons and outreach. Their new worship space is close to my home and I may be able of help them get to know that new neighborhood better. I will also meet with Keenan almost weekly for planning, collegial support and lectionary study. I will help with worship leadership, preaching, and pastoral care as needed. As other needs arise, I may take on additional responsibilities up to five hours a week.

Buddy and I plan to remain members at Old First during this transition period of several years. As it turns out, since I began the conversation with Noe Valley's Session, Keenan unexpectedly went into the hospital for emergency back surgery and is now recovering at home for an extended period. Consequently my presence at this time seems especially appreciated. My approval as a Commissioned Lay Pastor is on the Presbytery agenda for the June meeting. I hope members of Old First will attend my installation service that will probably be on June 19 or 26.

#### **Rediscovering Faith in Fiction**

"I've never stopped asking myself the question, what do I know for sure." Oprah Winfrey

For those who work a nine to five job, who travel extensively, or are occupied with any number of things from child care to shopping, 4:00 p.m. on Wednesday, May 25, 2011 will be just another day, just another hour on television. For those who Tivo that hour, or call in sick to watch it, they know the significance. It will be Oprah Winfrey's last show on ABC.

After 25 years of steering her talk show to the pinnacle of talk-show history, and of making herself a powerful presence in thousands of lives, Winfrey is moving on. She has her own network on cable TV appropriately named OWN. (Oprah Winfrey Network.)

For at least 15 of Oprah's 25 years I never watched her show. I can't remember the first show I saw or what the topic was but from then on, I found myself watching daily. The last few years, I rarely miss an airing. It's hard to identify the power Oprah has except to say that it is generated from her big heart, her warm soul, and from a genuine belief that people can always, always, be better than they are. I like to listen to people like that.

When she was asked, "what do you know for sure?" by the late film critic, Gene Siskel, she couldn't answer. She thought about what is *certain*, what is *real*, what is *true*. This is what evolved as her top 10 things she knows for sure.

- 1. What you put out comes back all the time, no matter what.
- 2. You define your own life. Don't let other people write your script.
- 3. Whatever someone did to you in the past, the past has no power over the present. Only you give it power.
- 4. When people show you who they are, believe them the first time.
- 5. Worrying is wasted time. Use the energy for doing something about whatever worries you.
- 6. What you believe has more power than what you dream, wish, or hope for. You become what you believe.
- 7. If the only prayer you ever say is 'thank you,' that will be enough.
- 8. The happiness you feel is in direct proportion to the love you give.
- 9. Failure is a signpost to turn you in another direction.
- 10. If you make a choice that goes against what everyone else thinks, **the world will not fall apart**.

What do you know for sure? The consideration of this question offers a good starting point for self-examination, for meditation, or for journal writing.
