The Book Nook

Glenn is halfway through "Colonel Roosevelt" which is the third of a trilogy, published in 2010. He writes, "I own the other two books of the trilogy and would be glad to loan them to anyone. The second one, "Theodore Rex," is the best biography or history I have ever read. Of course, I am a long time fan of Teddy."

I just finished "From the Sultan to Ataturk" which I checked out to learn more about another admirable (though brutal) leader. The current events in the Middle East peaked my curiosity about him. Not a great book but an interesting time in modern history that we may see replicated in the near future in some ways (very valuable lessons to know).

Joy just finished a loaned copy of Isabel Colegate's "The Shooting Party," set in Oxfordshire in the fall of 1913. It is full of hints of the blurring of class distinctions, the delusions of extremists, brutality of sport, so much foreboding and false romanticizing the coming war. It plays out well the interconnections of the choices people make. Colegate sets up certain expectations, and then surprises the reader. Very well crafted, evocative prose.

Mary Russell writes that she thoroughly enjoyed Betty White's latest autobiography, "Here We Go Again: My Life in Television, 1949-1995". It includes marvelous photos from all those years, and an update to describe her recent Super Bowl ad and her appearance as host of "Saturday Night Live." She is ever so bright and witty, and her writing just sparkles; I recommend this enjoyable read to anyone, but certainly to those of us who grew up along with television itself. She treasures genuine friendships with so many people; she'd be a pleasure to know! There are also wonderful and moving stories about her joy at working with animals, and devoted efforts on behalf of shelter animals. Enjoy!!

Rediscovering Faith through Fiction – Diane R. Molberg

You cannot travel on the path before you have become the Path itself. Gautama Buddha (from: The Songlines. Bruce Chatwin. 1987)

Stunningly handsome and profoundly charismatic, Bruce Chatwin became a voice for the wanderer, for the self in search of self. With each successive work he became engrossed in an examination of human wandering believing that "people on the move make a natural adjustment towards death."

A friend described Chatwin as a needle without a compass and Chatwin himself wondered in an almost off-hand way why his eternal restlessness made staying in any one place more than a month, unbearable. He married an Englishwoman and had children, but his soul and mind were on the move. And he was gay.

He mythologized each country and its peoples just as he mythologized himself. Published in 1977, In Patagonia became a kind of totem for the nomads of the world who believed, as Chatwin did, that the true self could be found on the way to the top of mountain as much as

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on the top of the mountain itself, and that the more remote the journey, the more powerful the epiphany. He sought answers to his constant question: why did the great teachers such as Christ and the Buddha recommend the road as the way to salvation? Published in 1987, Songlines follows the Aboriginals in Central Australia as they walked these invisible pathways across the continent.

In the late 1980s, Chatwin contracted AIDS. It was a strike against his sense of self, and to his death at the age of 48; he never admitted he had it. He maintained he had fallen victim to a South African mold fungus.

In a pitiful example of the shame and fear associated with this insidious disease, AIDS, to this day, despite the high recognition Chatwin's works are given (he was a brilliant writer), his work is treated with skepticism. "If he lied about his life," some say, "why should we believe what he writes."

In addition to Songlines and In Patagonia, Chatwin's other books include The Viceroy of Ouidah, On the Black Hill. His letters have just been published: Under the Sun, ed. by Nicholas Shakespeare.
