Maggi's Musings

This month begins with World Communion Sunday and our annual Peacemaking Offering. By celebrating communion with our sisters and brothers around the world and contributing to the Peacemaking Offering, we support those who work for wholeness, healing, and peace for this city, this country and the world. We do this because we have been called to do so by the Prince of Peace, who longs for us to be peacemakers in this chaotic world.

I am reminded, this year, by how much we need peace in the world and yet how it always feels somehow beyond our reach. I know there is such a need for peace and yet, I admit, I only focus on it for about a week before it drops out of my consciousness. Some thirty years ago, this church signed up as a Peacemaking Church. I think we need to renew that commitment once again. I'm challenging both you and me to return to intentional peacemaking in our prayer and in our everyday interaction with our family, friends, church and city.

- 1. Seek peace as a focused spiritual practice: Read a different scripture passage about peace (next page) each day, or re-read and meditate upon just one of the passage for a whole week, or pray using the Prayer of St. Francis of Assisi.
- 2. Pray that you can be a peacemaker, pray for peace in this city, and pray for a particular issue or person on the world stage each day.
- 3. As you go about your everyday live really look for the ways that you can be a person of peace, of wholeness, of hope, of calm in our city.

Let's see how God might transform us and the world this October,

100th Anniversary of Cornerstone, August 29 Old First Presbyterian Church Receives City Honor

Over eighty members and guests of Old First Presbyterian Church celebrated the 100th anniversary of the laying of the cornerstone of the present church building on August 29. The evening – full of history, camaraderie, food, music and fun – was capped by the appearance of the Honorable David Chiu, president of the San Francisco Board of Supervisors. Chiu, also a Presbyterian, honored Old First Presbyterian Church with a Certificate of Honor from the Board of Supervisors which praised the church's philanthropic work and the 100th anniversary of the building.

The evening began outside with a ceremony commemorating the original 1911 cornerstone ceremony. The program featured the Reverend Calvin Chinn from the San Francisco Presbytery; the Reverend James McDonald, PhD, president of San Francisco Theological Seminary and the Reverend Christine McSpadden, a canon of Grace Episcopal Cathedral.

Following the ceremony, the crowd gathered in the Fellowship Hall and heard a bit of the history of the church from our pastor, the Reverend Maggi Henderson, Stephen Taber, Chinn, and the Reverend Roger Hull, a former pastor of Old First Presbyterian Church. Roving throughout the hall in 1911 dress were members of the Greater Bay Area Costumers Guild as well as members of the church.

Welcome: A Communal Response to Poverty

The Welcome ministry has had an amazing year. When I began at Welcome in 2002, our main programs were the Welcome Center (a light lunch from 2:00-4:00 pm on Tuesdays) and

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Community Dinners (a full meal every second and fourth Saturday from 5:30-7:00 pm). These programs continue to be the only programs in the city that serve people as they are seated, and staffed by volunteers who eat with the guests. Together these meals serve more than 5,952 meals a year.

In addition to serving meals, our special projects creatively respond to urgent needs facing the homeless in our Polk Gulch neighborhood. In the past, this has included an identification project and creating urban farms. The Free Farm on Eddy and Gough, built in the ashes of St. Paulus Church which burned down in the '90's, is built from materials diverted from the dump and includes a mental health care labyrinth. Since it was created in February of 2010, it has given away more than 4,000 pounds of free produce to the neighborhood, served more than 4,900 lunches, resulted in an adult baptism and taught countless individuals about food justice issues in San Francisco.

This past year, Welcome began using the history and writings of faithful homeless LGBTQ youth from the 60's as bible study with contemporary homeless LGBTQ youth in San Francisco. This project, called Vanguard, resulted in a magazine enabling the youth talk about their issues, a national speaking tour to educate congregations about the issues of LGBTQ youth in San Francisco, and Welcome being invited to talk about our innovative project at conferences including the National End Homelessness Conference.

Most importantly, I want to take this opportunity to our friends at Old First. Without your support, both in the use of facilities and mission giving, Welcome would not be able to continue the programs that for a decade have feed the most vulnerable members of the neighborhood, or to create innovative new ideas that educate congregations and organizations across the country about ways we can faithfully respond to poverty.
