SEPTEMBER SERMONS

As Pastor Maggi Henderson concludes her sabbatical this month, we welcome both familiar and new faces to our pulpit.

The Reverend **Erwin Barron**, PhD, will preach and celebrate communion on **September 2**. Erwin, our recently named parish associate, has been part of our community for 16 years. Erwin teaches literature at City College and ethics at the Graduate Theological Union. At various times he has served Old First Presbyterian Church as director of Christian education and briefly as interim pastor. Erwin has moderated session meetings during Maggi's absence.

The Reverend **Susan Ashton**, DMin, will preach on **September 9**. A long-time friend of Old First Presbyterian Church, Susan was a parish associate in the '90s and served briefly – along with Erwin – as interim pastor. From 2008 to 2011 she was pastor at Ocean Avenue Presbyterian. During this sabbatical period, she has helped our deacons and elders provide pastoral care.

The Reverend **Elizabeth "Dean" McDonald,** DMin, will preach and celebrate communion on **September 16**. You'll want to meet her, as she's leading our congregational retreat September 28-30. Before moving to the Bay Area last summer with her husband, new SFTS President James "Jim" McDonald, Dean was director of the College of Preachers at Washington National Cathedral and a worship leader there. Earlier she served congregations in Indiana, Philadelphia, and Washington, DC. She has taught at the Cathedral School for Girls, Wesley Theological Seminary, and most recently in the DMin program at SFTS. A pastoral counselor, she currently sees clients at the Interfaith Counseling Center at SFTS. *Fun fact:* Dean's husband Jim McDonald and Mary Russell were childhood friends!

The Reverend **Victor Floyd**, Associate Pastor of the Metropolitan Community Church [MCC] of San Francisco, will preach on **September 23**. Before his ordination in the MCC and the United Church of UCC, he served three Presbyterian churches as music director. He received the 2009 Award in Queer Theology from the Center for Lesbian and Gay Studies at the Pacific School of Religion. A frequent conference presenter, he is a proponent of the Iona Community, InterPlay and interfaith dialogue. *Fun fact:* Pam Byers first met Victor when he sang at the 1999 Covenant Conference in Atlanta.

We conclude our Festival of Preaching when Elder **Andy Cheng** preaches on **September 30.** An Old First member since he moved to San Francisco in 1992 and an elder since 1997, Andy serves as a San Francisco Superior Court Judge. Earlier he worked in the City Attorney's Office and the U.S. Attorney's Office. Andy and Yvonne Cheng were married at Old First in 1993 and have three children, Samuel, Joshua, and Annie. Following his mother's example, Sam was ordained as a deacon in 2012.

FAREWELL AND THANKS TO OUR MUSIC DIRECTOR

Our music director, Jay Pierson, DMA, will leave Old First Presbyterian Church in September, after thirteen years of outstanding service in several roles. He and his partner Michael will be moving to North Carolina, where he taught before coming to San Francisco. Jay will conduct a final choral concert at 4:00 pm on Sunday afternoon, September 9, including several of his original compositions. (Mark your calendars now!)

Jay came to Old First Presbyterian Church as baritone soloist and section leader in 1999, and served in that role through 2006. He was baptized and joined the church in 2000. Beginning in 2003 he substituted for then music director Ken Matthews whenever Ken was traveling or ill. Jay became the interim music director in fall 2006 and was hired as music director in January 2008.

Jay has composed more than sixty-five introits, anthems, and hymn arrangements for the choir, which also premiered his *Missa Concordia* (with soloists and chamber orchestra) in October 2009. That concert, which also featured half a dozen compositions by Felix Mendelssohn, was recorded in a CD; he also oversaw production of a CD of Christmas carols in 2011.

Beside his work at Old First Presbyterian Church, Jay has an active private teaching practice and was on the music faculty at Santa Clara University from 2004 to 2007. He has applied his two degrees in voice performance from the Eastman School of Music to helping improve the vocal technique of our mostly amateur choir. His extensive contacts in the local music community have brought many excellent musicians, recently including the *Colla Voce* ensemble, to sing or perform with the choir. He conducted the inaugural concert of the Bay Area Rainbow Symphony in 2008 at Old First Presbyterian Church.

The congregation will have a chance to celebrate Jay's leadership and his many gifts to us in a reception following worship on his final Sunday, September 16. Please plan to be there and let Jay know what the music has meant to you! *–Pam Byers*

2012 General Assembly Strongly Adopts Overture from Old First

The Presbyterian Church met in General Assembly for ten days in Pittsburgh in early July. Susan Ashton attended as an observer; I attended as the official Overture Advocate for an overture from San Francisco (and six other presbyteries), which our session had originally sent to our presbytery.

While there was plenty of high drama, perhaps the biggest news is what was *not* dramatic. At every General Assembly since Old First Presbyterian Church sent its first overture in 1996 (the assembly that gave us "fidelity and chastity"), the highest tension has surrounded the Church Orders Committee. This year, although that committee considered a dozen or so ingenious efforts to re-instate "fidelity and chastity" in one way or another, there were relatively few observers occupying the 300 chairs set up for us, and only 19 people signed up to address the committee. (In past years it's been more like 200.)

After thoughtful discussion, the committee rejected all efforts to go backwards on ordination standards and instead adopted by a two-thirds vote the overture we sent. The assembly itself also defeated retrograde actions and by a more than two-to-one margin passed our overture and requested that it be reported to every presbytery.

The overture which has now been strongly adopted as policy by the General Assembly states the obvious fact that faithful, Bible-believing Presbyterians "hold different views about what the Scriptures teach concerning the morality of committed, same-gender relationships." Acknowledging that the PC(USA) "does not have one interpretation of Scripture in this matter," it asks the church to "commit ourselves to continue respectful dialogue with those who hold differing convictions, to welcome one another for God's glory, and not to vilify those whose convictions we believe to be in error."

The passion that in former years has gone to the Church Orders Committee, this year was spent in the Civil Unions and Marriage Committee. A closely divided committee sent to the floor a recommendation to amend the church's constitution to change the definition of marriage from "a civil contract between a man and a woman" to "a covenant between two people." After lengthy floor debate, the Assembly voted instead to undertake (another!) two-year study of the meaning of Christian marriage. Sadly, neither the committee nor the assembly paid much attention to the overtures from fourteen presbyteries asking for a ruling to permit pastors to conduct same-gender civil marriages where they are legal, without fear of prosecution in the church courts.

The assembly took action on two Confessions (the Heidelberg Catechism and the Belhar Confession), reenvisioning presbyteries and synods, immigration, gun control, economic justice, and a host of other issues. The other highest profile discussions concerned peace and justice in the Mideast. By a three-vote margin, the Assembly voted against divestment in four companies that (many believe) aid in the Israeli

occupation of the Palestinian Territories; however, it did approve boycotts of Israeli products from the occupied territories.

- Future of Old First Presbyterian Church and the PC(USA) Need to retain visitors and younger people, be welcoming at coffee hour, join/do activities with other congregations with assistance from Presbytery contacts, less focus on being Presbyterian and more focus Christ's message, "Who we are" just the age groups <u>most</u>-represented now, 40s, 50s, 60s and up important to recognize this! More-colorful and informative brochure in the pew racks can help to inform and attract Concerts audiences. Return to assigning "Buddies" of similar interests to new members. Use Pastor Henderson's sabbatical time this summer to discover more about "who we are" in order to continue moving forward

- **Music and Worship** Praise dancers in worship, Taizé music, orchestra more often, traditional hymns, guitar accompaniment; new hymns and occasional use of appropriate "pop" music, responsive readings, stand when the Gospel is read, variety of current and older hymns for congregational singing
- Ordination Need to acknowledge everyone's opinions.
- Seniors Services Senior Center funding, volunteers and increasing attendance, Keeping our senior members and visitors connected
- **Social gatherings** Dinner/lunch circles, parish tea parties, church picnic, all-church retreat (now scheduled for September 28-30 at Mount Hermon Conference Center), gatherings at members' homes for issues discussions; and welcoming potential new members.
- Youth Programs Involve youth in assisting in Sunday School and in worship.
