Advent began this past Sunday, November 28. Advent is a time to prepare for the coming of the Christ Child, which we will celebrate on Christmas Eve. As early as the 4th Century Christians set a time aside for devotion and a deepening of faith in the days before Christmas. This season we are guided by Isaiah 11:1-10. You will see this passage in liturgical art and music and in the word both spoken and read. We have also taken up the tradition of the Jesse Tree inspired by the Isaiah passage. Each week symbols of God's peace will be displayed on its branches.

I encourage you to take up and commit to an Advent practice: Regularly read (maybe even memorize) the Isaiah passage, read and pray using the devotional booklet "Hark the Glad Sound," or begin to look for small shoots or sprouts of peace in the world. Let's be wild and talk and share with other church members or friends just what we are doing and experiencing during Advent. May God's peace and hope grow in us all, as we move towards the joy of Christmas.

Hark the Glad Sound: This Year's Advent Devotional

This year's advent devotional is all about beloved Christmas carols. Our booklet is by a church musician, Barry Bobb, and features twelve carols. Each section highlights the carol's words followed by a short but illuminating scripture passage. Then we have a meditation helping us reflect and dig deep into the meaning. A prayer concludes the written material. "Hear the Song" concludes each section with suggestions for audio or video presentations of the carol on the Internet.

The featured artists are quite varied and include a wide range of musical styles. They include Burl Ives, the Cambridge Singers, the Crash Test Dummies, Mary Chapin Carpenter, The Chieftains, and many more. An enriching possibility would be to repeat a reading on a different day listening to an alternate musical interpretation. Our music director may also include these carols during worship. The twelve carols are: In the Bleak Midwinter, What Child is This, The Angel Gabriel from Heaven Came (a Basque carol), My Soul Now Magnifies the Lord, Of the Father's Love Begotten, Once in Royal David's City, 'Twas in the Moon of Wintertime (Huron carol), Lo, He Comes with Clouds Descending, Where Shepherds Lately Knelt, O Come, O Come, Emmanuel, From Heaven Above to Earth I Come, and Mary Did You Know?

If you have not yet picked up a copy of *Hark the Glad Sound*, check with an usher at worship or contact the church office to have one sent to you.

A Stump, a Wolf, and a Lamb! Advent Scripture Study, December 6 and 13, 9:30 am

What happens when a shoot comes from the stump of seemingly dead tree? That's the image we have in Isaiah 11, which will be our primary scriptural focus of our Advent worship. We'll even have a bare branch in the chancel. That is followed by the famous "peaceable kingdom" passage of the wolf lying down with the lamb. We will examine these scriptures and the metaphors they present in adult education on two Sundays in December. We will look at why these passages are so important in the Messiah covenants. We will think about where the stumps are in our lives and how we can find hope rising in a new shoot. December 13 is Gun Violence Prevention Sabbath. The class that day will look at the peaceable kingdom passage and how God brings peace and an end to violence. Erwin Barron and Andrea Segura Smith will lead these discussions at 9:30 on December 6 and 13 in the Munro Room.

Advent Art

During this Advent, the art in the panels behind the choir loft features two biblical themes: "The Peaceable Kingdom" from Isaiah 11:1-10, and "Mary Visits Elizabeth" from Luke 1: 39-45.



In the peaceable kingdom wild beasts, domestic animals, and children dwell together in peace. "They will neither harm nor destroy on all my holy mountain, for the earth will be filled with the knowledge of the Lord as the waters cover the sea" (Isaiah 11:9). The artwork participants water-colored the creatures described in this passage. The real challenge came from the composition, as there were nearly twelve species that needed to be painted.

In the following theme, where Mary visits her cousin Elizabeth, the participants also water-colored and then hand decorated with fabric. Mary is the one wears blue. As the Advent passage moves on the two pregnant women will be added to the center of the art.

The Story of the Bible: Exploring the Origins and Evolution of the Bible

The Bible is not a single book written as an integrated work. Rather, it is a collection of writings produced at different times by diverse communities and has been passed down to us together with a complex interpretive history.

During the first half of 2016, you can get an introduction to the fascinating story of how the Bible came into being as our holy book. Each Sunday at 12:30 (except the second Sunday of a month, Palm Sunday and Easter) beginning January 17, we will present video lectures by Luke Timothy Johnson, a professor at Emory University, followed by discussion.

This course includes who wrote the Bible and why, how it was edited reformulated, the various translations of the Bible, and how different groups of Christians and Jews interpreted it.

Coming in January 2016: All-Church Survey, "Holy Cow!"

Old First is beginning a planning process for the church's future, and our starting point will be a survey of the entire congregation. Experts recommend that congregations look at their mission every five to ten years; and the last time we did this was in 2005, so we are due. We hope that that everyone will take part.

Old First has engaged a national consulting firm, Holy Cow! Consulting. (Yes, that's its real name.) Holy Cow! has worked with over a thousand congregations and is highly recommended. We will take the same survey that hundreds of congregations have taken, including many in our denomination.

The Holy Cow! survey is comprehensive. It will take twenty to thirty minutes to complete. There are no wrong answers. We can complete the survey online or with pen and paper. All responses will be completely anonymous.

The survey will open on January 10 and close on January 31. When the survey is completed, the results will require interpretation, and a Holy Cow! facilitator will help us with that.

What do we hope we will learn from the survey? Six things:

- An in-depth look at the experiences, perceptions and aspirations of the congregation.
- The congregation's over-all level of satisfaction and energy.
- Where, in a general sense, the congregation would like to see Old First go.
- Some of the critical success factors in getting from where we are now to wherever we want to be in the future
- A sense of our readiness for change. (As Ken McFayden has said, everybody wants to grow, but nobody wants to change.)
- Discovery of potential resources that we have missed.

The survey is an essential first step in our planning process. Old First wants everyone's participation to gain a good sense of where we are as a congregation. If we do have everyone's participation, the survey will be a big first step.

One of the survey questions asks how effective Old First has been in fulfilling its mission as expressed in its mission statement. You may want to save a copy of our mission statement, so you will have it in mind when you respond to the survey. (Our current mission statement, adopted in 2005, follows this article.)

October 2015 Church Retreat Report by Bill Chauvin and Tom Crusta

This is a series written by different people, describing their experience and impressions of the retreat held at Mt. Hermon last month. There may be more in the future.

We are new to Old First, having joined the choir just a few months ago. We have had the pleasure of singing with Larry Marietta for many years in the San Francisco City Chorus, a wonderful community choir, and we were thrilled to hear that he was now the music director at Old First, and we wanted to be a part of that. We are also friends with Jeanne Kirkwood, and so we have sung for special occasions a few times at Old First, but other than that, we knew little about the community. So when we heard that there was going to be a retreat, we thought it would be a great opportunity to get to know some of the members, and get a better feeling for just what Old First was all about. And we were right.

Three congregations came together for this retreat, and engaged Dr. Roger Nishioka to give a lecture series, and he was wonderful, funny, warm, and insightful. After his talks we would break into smaller groups, with each congregation forming separate groups. Through interaction in the Old First small group, by discussing the lecture series, we came to know some familiar faces as real people. But more than that, we grew to discover that Old First is a warm, welcoming and inclusive community. We felt we were instantly a part of the group, engaging in these discussions, voicing our views, and experiencing the many viewpoints of everyone else. We also came to know a bit about the various outreach opportunities that Old First has to offer. And, perhaps most importantly, through sharing meals, and just chatting, and playing charades and doing jigsaw puzzles, we came to feel that this group, although new to us, were not just new acquaintances, but new friends, and that we were now a part of the Old First community, and that felt very good.

We are both so glad to have had this opportunity to get to know Old First and its members better, and are appreciative of the warm reception, and strong feeling of inclusion that this retreat provided.
