# OFPC-ST ANDREW'S EAST PULPIT EXCHANGE: "WELCOME, BARBARA QUIGLEY!"

From July 5 through August 9 this year, Old First Presbyterian Church and St Andrew's East Parish Church (a parish of the Church of Scotland in Glasgow, Scotland) are getting to meet each other's pastor and worship with her. On Sunday afternoon, June 28, our pastor Maggi Henderson flew to Glasgow, Scotland, where the minister of St Andrew's East, the Reverend Barbara Quigley, met her and began introducing her to the congregation in Glasgow.

On Thursday, July 2, Barbara flies to San Francisco. She'll settle in to Maggi's house over the weekend and lead us in worship on Sunday, July 5. Barbara will be in residence as our pulpit exchange minister through mid-August and will then take vacation time seeing more of Northern California. During this period, Maggi will be doing pastoral work with and among the people of St Andrew's East including preaching and leading worship on Sundays. As Barbara will do, Maggi will also take vacation time at the end of August seeing more of Scotland. Maggi will return to lead worship on August, 30.

During Barbara's time with us, she will lead worship and preach, meet and work with participants of our various programs, and offer pastoral care for church and community as Maggi does. There will be a festive coffee hour after worship on Sunday, July 5, to celebrate her arrival. Please join us for worship and the coffee hour to welcome Barbara.

# Thinking and Planning Ahead for Senior Housing

Episcopal Community Services of San Francisco, Aging and Disability Resource Housing, and the Curry Senior Center have put together the most complete list affordable and low income housing opportunities in the Bay area. What I have learned in my time in San Francisco is that while there is Senior Housing available it is virtually impossible, to find housing on the spur of the moment. There are waiting lists that can be a year to many years in length. That means one needs to get on the list long before we think we are "old." It takes forethought and a tenacity to check sites out, fill out paperwork, get on a list and check back again and again. Even though I am 53 I have identified a number of places I will put my name into as I get closer to retirement age. Fortunately, we Presbyterians are a tenacious group!

#### Christian Education with Novelist Diane Molberg, September 13, 20

We're delighted to have Diane Molberg facilitate two classes in September at 9:30 am.

#### • September 13: *Dandelion Wine*, a Novel by Ray Bradbury

This novel is a collection of stand-alone stories. They are linked when read as a novel, but can easily be accommodated to limiting discussion to one story. There are no chapters as such, but Diane proposes to read and discuss the segment called "The Love Story:"

You do things and you don't watch...then all of a sudden you look at what you're doing and it's like the first time. It happens to everyone at least once, and while it lasts the ordinary business of living becomes a magical series of discoveries and revelations. It happened to Douglas Spaulding the summer he was twelve.

Set in 1928 in small town America, the essence of summer pours gold and glowing from the imagination and compassion of Ray Bradbury in this, his best known and most loved novel.

Written in lyrical language, "The Love Story" opens on "the middle of the first day of August," when Bill Forester gets out of his car and invites young Douglas to have a dish of ice cream with him. Thus begins Forester's own "coming of age," a journey into the wisdom and magic of Miss Helen Loomis.

# • September 20: "The Chrysanthemums," a Short Story by John Steinbeck

Elisa Allen, a woman approaching middle age, is at a point in her life when she has begun to realize that her energy and creative drive far exceed the opportunities for their expression. When a tinker, passing through the area, sparks her interest and kindles her imagination her life changes. John Steinbeck published "The Chrysanthemums" in a collection of stories called *The Long Valley* (1938). "The Chrysanthemums" is set in the Salinas Valley in California where Steinbeck was born, the fertile farmland nourishing his imagination. Steinbeck's characters, like Henry Allen, are quite pleased to be able to make a decent living, but equally important, like Elisa Allen, they are beginning to sense that not everybody can be satisfied by bread alone. Steinbeck is one of America's premier authors.

They say money can't buy happiness, but research indicates this may not be entirely true. The trick is to focus on what you *give*, rather than what you *get*. So where should you got "purchase" this elusive state of joy?

The answer: your church, charities, community donation drives – anyplace you can *donate* money. The key word? Donate. Those who donate money tend to be happier than those who don't.

According to our research, Presbyterian in households that have pledged money to their church are happier than those in non-pledging households.

However – and this is important – giving more money does not make you happier, and the link between pledging and happiness exists at *all* income levels. It's not the quantity that counts; what matters is the habit of giving *regularly*.

Our research finds that donating just once to a cause does not impact general happiness – no matter how much you give.

And it's not just happiness that is part of the equation. People in pledging households are also more optimistic about their future and are more likely to believe that people can generally be trusted.

One caveat to this research is that we cannot determine what causes what – does giving away money make people happier, or are happy people more likely to give away money?

Either way, one thing is clear: donating money is the sign of a happy persona. And it's not likely to make the recipient too sad either.
