## MAGGI'S MUSINGS

Our pulpit exchange begins Sunday, July 5, and continues through Sunday, August 7. As many of you already know, this summer Old First Presbyterian Church is exchanging pastors with St. Andrews's East Parish Church in Glasgow, Scotland. The minister of St. Andrew's East, the Reverend Barbara Quigley, is coming to Old First Presbyterian Church to take my role in worship, preaching and pastoral duties, while I go to Glasgow and take on hers at St. Andrew's East. Barbara and her daughter came to worship at Old First a few back and that began the conversation. A pulpit exchange has long been a tradition in many churches but it is a new experience for Old First and for me. It's a unique gift for both churches and pastors. Really, I get the chance to live and work in Scotland (the homeland of American Presbyterianism) and she gets to live in work in our fabulous San Francisco and serve in this place of deep roots made up of folks who seek to serve Christ in the city. The hope and expectation is that the churches and the pastors will learn from the each other and will all be richer for the experience.

To practical details: I will fly to Glasgow after worship on Sunday, June 28, and will spend a few days with Barbara. She will then introduce me to the in's and out's of St Andrew's and I will tell her about Old First. A few days later she will fly to San Francisco and preach her first sermon on July 5. In the latter half of August we will both take two weeks of vacation. I will return from Glasgow on August 24. Barbara and I will have a few days together before she flies home to Scotland. My first Sunday back in the pulpit will be August 28.

Please pray for me as I get ready to go to Glasgow and while I am away. I am excited but am also, admittedly, a bit anxious. To go to a place where I know no one and to a totally new church is an adventure. I am really looking forward to learning from and sharing with the people of St. Andrews East. And I know you will be welcoming and hospitable to Barbara, and will delight in experiencing something new. ## GREETINGS FROM BARBARA QUIGLEY MINISTER OF ST. ANDREW'S EAST PARISH CHURCH, GLASGOW

Barbara Quigley will be exchanging roles with our Pastor Henderson during July and August this summer. In her greetings below she introduces herself.

I am getting really excited about coming to Old First Presbyterian Church for the summer. Let me introduce myself; I am Barbara (never anything else) a Scots Presbyterian which, with my name, is a bit strange. Quigley is an Irish Catholic name and the reason I am not Roman Catholic is to do with the Great War (1914-1918) and I'll tell you about that later. The reason I was born in Yorkshire in the North of England and not Scotland, is to do with the Second World

War (1939-45) and I'll tell you about that later. The reason I'm Presbyterian is to do with an almighty row I had with the Archbishop of Canterbury in 1975 and I'll tell you about that later.

I studied Theology at the University of St Andrews and at Duke University in North Carolina. I studied Education at Birmingham University and History at Open/Dundee University.

I have been minister of Glasgow: St Andrew's East for four years. Before that I taught Religion and Philosophy and History in the High School of Dundee, the second oldest school in Scotland and the school attended by the Scottish patriot William Wallace. (Ever seen the film 'Brave-heart'?) At 'the High' I specialised in teaching Medical Ethics. Whilst in Dundee I also ran a couple of churches on a part time basis.

My first church was New Stevenston: Wrangholm Kirk in North Lanarkshire just outside Glasgow. This was an area of coal mining and then steel making. When I went there in 1979 I was one of the first women ordained by the Church of Scotland (about 12<sup>th</sup> or 13<sup>th</sup>) so I was very much a novelty and had to forge my own way as a 26 year old woman. It had its up and downs. Some male colleagues wouldn't allow me anywhere near their churches whilst others treated me as simply another minister. I don't know if I did ministry any different from the men, I just did it.

Whilst in New Stevenston I met and married the new Methodist minister in the village. David Firth and I have been married for 27 years and have one daughter Eilidh now 25. David is now Methodist minister in Carlisle, the last city in England before you get to the Scottish border. It's about 90 minutes away from Glasgow. He enjoys hillwalking in the Lake District and for his 60th birthday he took up distance running. He will not be coming to San Francisco; he will be looking after Angus our rescue dog who enjoys chasing seagulls and shouting at squirrels.

Eilidh is a freelance musician playing fiddle and teaching traditional Scottish Music as well as violin and piano. Her band, Barluath (pronounced bar loo ah), has just released its second album. Check them out at www.barluath.com. Eilidh will be with me for the end of my stay with you, for a holiday before taking up a scholarship to go to Valley of the Moon fiddle camp in California again.

My theology is pretty much left of mainstream (radical, liberal) though I'm no great shakes at theology, my love is mediaeval church history; I'm an historian not a theologian. My style of leading worship has become more relaxed over the years. It doesn't have to be perfect so long as it is a faithful witness by God's people. I love to include as many people as possible in leading worship which was a bit of a new thought for St Andrew's East when I arrived. They have taken to it and are so willing to offer what they can and are to God. At Advent 2014 we switched to the Narrative Lectionary. Having been round the Revised Common Lectionary since 1979 I needed something new. So far it seems to be leading people in their worship of God and understanding our place in God's world.

For hobbies I sing in the Community Choir of Scottish Opera and enjoy being out in the countryside. Five years ago I was finally diagnosed with Fibromyalgia so I have to behave myself and not overdo things, so no hillwalking but there is still plenty to see on low level trails.

# FROM THE WORSHIP COMMITTEE: A GIFT, A BLESSING, A CHALLENGE

What can be all three things in the title above? Lay leadership! Here at Old First we have a long tradition of members leading parts of the church service. It can be scary when you first look out at the congregation. Once started, it's an exciting and moving experience, unique to church services. I find it's a gift to have heard so many different voices sharing their faith in prayer and liturgy. And it's a blessing to be able to share and stretch your own faith practices.

As one lay liturgist says, "Being a lay liturgist at Old First is a privilege and a responsibility to lead worship and to give of yourself. Unlike leadership in the secular work environment, I find that worship leadership is not about putting on a performance that focuses on you, but it is about service that focuses on God."

You can choose to be the liturgist assisting Maggi with the service or to lead the prayers of the people. As liturgist you read the call to worship, confession, assurance of forgiveness, prayer for illumination (yours or one already written), and read the first reading. On communion days you may also assist at the table. Many people like to add a short prayer or comment before the various sections. However this is not absolutely necessary. You can choose to simply read from the bulletin.

When leading the prayers of the people, most chose to write their own prayers but you can also use prayers from other sources. Maggi has many resources she can share to inspire you. It's also possible to write a prayer and have someone else lead the prayer for you. Instructions are sent out each week. The church library and the pastor have reference books. The Worship Committee members can train or guide you.

Is God calling you to this special service to the church? If you're interested contact Cindy Burt, who schedules the prayers of the people volunteers, or AnnieScott Rogers, who introduces folks to the lay liturgist role, or any other member of the Worship Committee – Linda Reyder, Hsiaochien Chuang, Chris Burt, Lori Yamauchi – during coffee hour. We will be delighted to get you started.

For all who have shared of themselves by leading the prayers or being liturgist, the Worship Committee thanks you for your service.
