Souper Bowl of Caring, February 5

The Confirmation Class invites you to take part in the *Souper Bowl of Caring* February 5. They will collect canned goods (potted meat, chili, tuna are a big hit) or any loose change you might have and all will go to the SF/Marin Food Bank.

The *Souper Bowl of Caring* grew out of a simple prayer: "Lord, even as we enjoy the Super Bowl football game, help us be mindful of those who are without a bowl of soup to eat." The prayer has inspired a youthled movement to help hungry and hurting people around the world.

This prayer, delivered by Brad Smith, then a seminary intern serving at Spring Valley Presbyterian Church in Columbia, SC (Our own Erwin Barron's Father's Church), gave birth to an idea. Why not use Super Bowl weekend, a time when people come together for football and fun, also to unify the nation for a higher good: collecting dollars and canned food for the needy? Youth could collect donations at their schools and churches in soup pots, and then send every dollar *directly* to a local charity of *their own* choice. (In our case this is the SF/Marin Food Bank.)

The senior high youth of Spring Valley Presbyterian liked the idea so much they decided to invite other area churches to join the team. Twenty-two Columbia churches participated that first year, reporting their results so a total could be determined, and then sending all \$5,700 they had raised to area non-profits.

That was 1990. Since then, ordinary young people have generated an extraordinary more than \$100 million for soup kitchens, food banks and other charities in communities across the country. In addition, hundreds of thousands of youth have experienced for themselves the joy and satisfaction of giving and serving, inspiring people of all ages to follow their generous example.

- Serves hot, nutritious breakfasts 3 days each week to an average of 165 guests.
- Serves about 35,000 meals and distributes about 9,000 bags of food per year.
- Is an all-volunteer effort with no paid staff.

Unlike One Great Hour of Sharing, which addresses world-wide hunger, the Presbytery Hunger Fund alleviates hunger in our own communities. With our help, the Presbytery Hunger Fund can continue to help support the hunger-relief programs of smaller congregations that can do much more with a little help. Interfaith Welcome Congregations Exceed Goal for Teddy Bears for Children in Refugee Camps

The Interfaith Welcome congregations that joined together to help refugees have raised over \$20,000 to buy teddy bears for refugee children. The congregations' goal was to deliver 5,000 teddy bears to Syrian children in a refugee camp in Jordan. We exceeded it, thanks to the extraordinary response to the campaign. Research has shown that cuddly, stuffed animals measurably reduce anxiety and provide solace to children coping with loss and disruption. A teddy bear is emergency medicine. It helps a child feel more safe and secure and reduces anxiety symptoms, such as nightmares, bed-wetting and aggressive behavior.

Interfaith Welcome is a group of Bay Area congregations that are working together to:

- Help refugees find safety, welcome, freedom and independence,
- Partner with refugee resettlement agencies so that they can do more for refugees, and
- Engage our congregations and communities to provide awareness, advocacy, direct service and fundraising.

Bill Campbell of Old First and Nancy Levine of Temple Emanu-El lead the group.

Presbytery of SF Congregations Contribute Nearly \$14,000 in Four Months for Refugee Resettlement in Oakland, Presbytery of SF Matches \$10,000

To support its congregations' efforts to welcome refugees and help them rebuild their lives, last September the Presbytery of San Francisco announced an offer to match congregations' contributions to the Oakland office of the International Rescue Committee (IRC).

The presbytery's matching offer applied to contributions that churches made between September 1, 2016, and June 30, 2017, to an overall maximum of \$10,000. Six months before the deadline, Old First and six other congregations quickly contributed \$13,589. The Presbytery added its \$10,000 match.

While small compared with the total need, these contributions will provide real help to refugee families who are arriving in the Bay Area. Until President Trump's January 27 executive order temporarily suspended the refugee program, the IRC's Oakland office was resettling about 450 refugees a year, or about 75 families, and helping them start anew in Oakland. A quarter of these newly-arriving refugees are under the age of five.

Old First's IRC contribution was within the Global Response part of our benevolence budget. The source of the presbytery match was the presbytery's Peacemaking Fund. This fund receives 25% of local churches' contributions to our denomination's annual Peace and Global Witness offering.

Decades-long missionary dream begins in Malawi: Mission Around the World January 23, 2017 by Tammy Warren | Mission Crossroads

LOUISVILLE – God's plans and timing are different from ours. Just ask the Reverend Dr. Donna J. Sloan. Donna has packed her luggage, figuratively, more than once to answer God's call to mission—a call she has felt since she was nine years old, growing up in Campbell, Ohio. Donna recalls that when a teacher at Campbell Christian Center asked her what she wanted to be when she grew up, she said "I want to be a missionary nurse." Now in her 70s, Donna has been commissioned by the Presbyterian Church (USA) to teach church history and ethics as a long-term volunteer in Malawi.



It is often said that God qualifies the called rather than calling the qualified. While Donna waited for God's perfect timing to begin mission service, she earned a diploma in nursing; a bachelor's degree in sociology; master's degrees in public health, divinity and theology; and a doctorate in interdisciplinary arts and sciences that focused on the interrelatedness of religion and health. After each accomplishment, as well as after her ordination as a minister in the late 1980s, she thought, "Now I'm ready. God will send me now." Each time, however, she sensed it wasn't God's idea of the right time.

Throughout her careers as a registered nurse, ordained minister and college professor, Donna continued to work in New England, California and Ohio. She also cared for her aging parents for many years and taught philosophy and religious studies at Youngstown (Ohio) State University—courses she will also teach during her two-year mission as a professor at Zomba Theological College in South Central Africa. Students of ZTC represent all five Church of Central Africa Presbyterian synods: Blantyre, Harare, Livingstonia, Nkhoma and Zambia spread across the countries of Malawi, Zambia and Zimbabwe.

A few years ago Donna met retired mission co-worker JoAnn Griffith, who served in Ethiopia for more than four decades. JoAnn's enthusiasm for mission was contagious and caused Donna to reflect on her childhood dream of becoming a missionary. Donna traveled on a short-term mission to Ethiopia with JoAnn and was excited to work with the Oromo people, especially because she had learned through DNA testing that her ancestral heritage on her father's side is 99.4% from the Oromo people of Ethiopia.

That trip prompted Donna to complete an online application for mission service at pcusa.org/onedoor. She attended an orientation in October 2015, initially planning to serve in Ethiopia. At orientation she learned about the teaching position in Malawi. When she learned the courses she would teach at ZTC were the same as she had taught in Ohio, she became convinced that the timing of the position in Malawi was according to God's plan.

Since her retirement, Donna has been learning to play the harp—another long-time dream. She will take her harp with her to Malawi and continue lessons via Skype.


Even though several decades have passed since she initially recognized God's call, Donna remains excited and expectant about mission work. She's looking forward to all God has planned.

The Reverend Debbie Braaksma, Africa area coordinator, is pleased that Donna has answered God's call to mission. "She is a very special person. Her wisdom and life experiences are so needed in Malawi."

Musical Notes: Love Divine, All Loves Excelling

As February is the month of love, this beloved text may come immediately to mind: "Love Divine, All Loves Excelling" was written by the priest and evangelist Charles Wesley (1707-1788) and first published in *Hymns for those that Seek, and those that have Redemption*, 1747. Frank Baker, in *Representative Verse of Charles Wesley*, suggests that Wesley's text was inspired by a poem of John Dryden, set by Henry Purcell in his opera *King Arthur*, 1691:





In 1761 John Wesley set his brother's words to Purcell's melody, calling the tune WESTMINSTER, and including it in *Select Hymns with Tunes Annext*,1773. The hymn tune most closely associated with this text is BEECHER, composed by John Zundel (1815-1882) and this text and tune were first published together in *Christian Heart Songs*, 1870. The tune was named in honor of Henry Ward Beecher, who was the pastor of Brooklyn's Plymouth Church, where Zundel enjoyed a 30 year music ministry. In spite of its popularity, many 20th Century hymnologists declared BEECHER to be the worst hymn tune ever composed in modern times.

Beginning in the 1940s, the Welsh hymn tune HYFRYDOL [hih-FRIH-dull, meaning "tuneful" or "pleasant, began to gain acceptance as an "appropriately more dignified" alternative melody. One of the most popular Welsh hymn tunes, it was composed in 1831 by the 19-year-old Rowland Hugh Prichard (1811-1887), an assistant loom tender in the Welsh Flannel Manufacturing Company and a gifted amateur singer, song leader and sacred and secular song composer. — Larry Marietta, Music Director

Some days I get a bit distracted when a message goes out about a prayer request, the sharing of some information, or the discernment of problems and solutions... and then someone hits "Reply All" instead of simply replying to the original sender. I suspect that you, like me, get distracted – even overwhelmed – by weeding through these extra E-mails received daily. Somedays I fantasize about launching a "Reply All" message out that says "PLEASE DON'T REPLY ALL!" But I understand that that would just add to the quagmire. There are times when a reply all makes sense – we can all understand that. However, good form requires us all to contemplate a moment when responding to an E-mail and considering whether it can better addressed with a single "Reply" to the original sender rather than with "Reply All." –Maggi
