When I introduce myself at meetings, it is always quite a mouthful in to say "I am the Pastor at Old First Presbyterian Church." I often ponder that "old" and "first" might not be words held in as high a regard as they once were, and that folks may not even know what "Presbyterian" is.

You may have heard folks occasionally playing with our name by adding a "b" and making us "B'OLD First." I like that because it reminds me we have often been bold in our care and compassion for the community: helping start Edgewood Center for Children and Families for children over one hundred years ago (http://www.edgewood.org/), launching Larkin Street Youth Services (http://larkinstreetyouth.org/), hosting one of the largest – and first interfaith – food pantries in the city. I like "B'OLD" because, though change is often difficult, we step forward in faith and take on new ventures when we hear God's call.

This fall two things highlight this for me: First, we listened and heard God's call to hire Seminary Intern Liz Zupp when it wasn't planned or budgeted. We decided God would help find the way to do this and the church will step up in there giving to make this happen. Liz will bring to us her vision, insights, and her life-long Presbyterian background. We will help shape her, teach her, offer her experience as she seeks to minister in the 21st Century.

Second, we are B'OLD in hearing a challenge to support the Pam Byers memorial LGBTQ archive at the Presbyterian Historical Society (http://www.history.pcusa.org/). It honors our beloved Pam's work with Covenant Network (http://covnetpres.org/) but also says we can learn from the struggles and work of the past as we move into the future. The session heard the request and said yes, for we had to be a part of this venture. I invite you to read further about both of these steps forward in the text inside this issue of Shared Life.

Pray that God will help us be B'OLD to follow in the ways of Jesus and confess that love, compassion, risk, and justice are indeed ancient and primary life-giving attributes – old, first attributes that we need to step forward into God's vision, God's future.

Pam Byers Memorial LGBTQ Collection

The historical legacy of the movement for full inclusion of LGBTQ Presbyterians in the life and leadership of the Presbyterian Church (USA) is being recorded in a new archive housed at the Presbyterian Historical Society, the oldest and largest denominational archive in the United States. The collection will be named in the honor of Pam Byers, the founding Executive Director of the Covenant network of Presbyterians and longtime elder at Old First, who played a critical role in helping to create a Presbyterian Church "as generous and just as God's grace".

The archive will comprise physical and digital records, including organizational records, oral histories and living history videos, photographs, and personal papers of movement leaders. The archive will be constituted and maintained by professional archivists, and Pam's close colleagues, including her husband, Jeff, are seeking funding to support this project, as well as donations of papers and suggestions of persons who should be interviewed about their participation in the movement.

Old First's session voted at their last meeting to support this project with a donation from Old First of \$5,000 to the Presbyterian Historical Society, and you can be a part of this \$5,000 gift by making a donation to Old First Presbyterian Church and writing Pam Byers Memorial Archive. Pam was an active and beloved member and elder of Old First; she died in 2014.

OFPC Stewardship Pledge Drive 2017: Live Generously

1 Timothy 6:18-19, 2 Corinthians 8:9

The theme for the OFPC Stewardship Pledge Drive 2017 is Live Generously based upon 1 Timothy 6:18-19, "They are to do good. To be rich in good works, generous and ready to share, thus storing up for themselves the treasure of a good foundation for the future, so that they can take hold of the life that really is life" and 2 Corinthians 8:9, "For you know the generous act of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your sakes he became poor, so that by his poverty you might become rich."

Stewardship is very much about financial resources. Jesus spoke about it often, in parables, sermons and announcements. He spoke of material possessions, use of money and meeting the needs of the poor and generous giving. The act of giving is central to the Christian gospel. We give freely of ourselves in time, talents, prayer and money – which brings us into line with the early Christians to whom Paul said, "Whoever sows bountifully shall also reap bountifully... for God loves a cheerful giver."

Everything belongs to God. All that we are, all that we have, we received from God. We are the trustees and managers of that which we have received. Freely we have received, freely we give. We are God's bank account. In managing our finances we give to God first, that is generous, cheerful and systematic. The faithful steward says, "I will give a generous portion of my financial resources as an expression of gratitude and trust in God's promises. This is the main principle to faithful stewardship.

The month of November 2017 begins the Stewardship drive at Old First. November 5, 2017 marks the beginning of our drive. We will have speakers each Sunday on Minute for Stewardship addressing their faith, commitments to service and stewards of generous giving.

On November 26, 2017 we will join together to present our pledge cards at Old First. We prayerfully ask you to make a response. Your pledge will enable us to make robust plans for the coming year. This is a symbol of our individual and collective witness to Christ's presence in our lives and support of our ministry and our Church. Give generously and you will be rewarded abundantly.

Lavender Pen Tour

Erwin Barron and the San Francisco Gay Men's Chorus (SFGMC) will embark on October 7 on a soul-affirming, life-changing journey! The Lavender Pen Tour will share SFGMC's mission of community, activism and compassion throughout the South, supporting our LGBTQ+ brothers and sisters and promoting acceptance and love through music. We will be joined by the Oakland Interfaith Gospel Choir.

It is our hope that the music will encourage LGBTQ people and our allies to come together, provoke conversations and action around civil liberties for all, while raising funds for local LGBTQ organizations. It is our intention to have the tour fully underwritten so that all monies raised stay in the respective communities.

Erwin and the chorus leave for Jackson, Mississippi on October 7, then traveling for seven days on eight tour buses to Selma and Birmingham, Alabama; Knoxville, Tennessee; Greenville, South Carolina; and Charlotte, North Carolina. We will sing in large concert halls, but also meet in churches, schools, and state capitols wherever we go. In each city, we will have an interfaith religious service of inclusion.

August Session Meeting Report

Jeff Byers made a presentation covering the Pam Byers Memorial Lesbian Gay Bisexual Transgender Queer Collection to be housed at the Presbyterian Historical Society in Philadelphia. Jeff answered questions and requested that Old First Church support the collection with a \$5000 contribution.

Potential intern, Elizabeth "Liz" Zupp was introduced and explained a bit about herself and her education and background. There were several questions and she answered openly.

There was some discussion about the annual meeting.

Stewardship announced the theme this year is "Live Generously." Stewardship month will be November and Commitment Sunday will be November 26.

Bill Campbell reported on the International Rescue Committee Vision Project and announced the Global Pace and Witness offering will be the first Sunday in October.

Linda Reyder reported that the Worship Committee was scheduling Advent planning and that a coffee hour opportunity to conceive prayers for peace was being implemented.

The treasurer and Finance Committee are looking for a new bookkeeper and asked for any recommendations.

Planning Elder, John Kramar moved that Old First take advantage of the opportunity to contribute and support the Pam Byers Memorial LGBTQ collection with a pledge of \$5000. Robin Currier seconded and the motion passed.

Chris Burt reported that the Community Building Committee had been refining communication with external parties, increasing the internet footprint, getting new postcards in the pews, developing some recent history and considering additions to the digital directory.

It was confirmed that the next regular Session meeting will be on September 26.
