Maggi's Musings

We will celebrate the Epiphany on Sunday, January 7, 2018, when the Revered Deb Avery, the former pastor of First Presbyterian Oakland, will preach for us. We will continue the celebration with potluck lunch after church. We will recall the wise men from the East that followed the star to Bethlehem to worship the infant Jesus (Matthew 2:1-12).

Epiphany is the celebration of God's manifestation or self-revelation to the world in Jesus Christ. In particular, we celebrate the revelation of God's promise and purpose to the nations of the world, as the magi came from the East to worship to the Christ child, and God's covenant of grace is extended to all who believe the good news of Christ Jesus. The symbolism of light is important: not only because of the star that guided the magi, but as it relates to the bright dawning of God's self-revelation in Christ.

The word "epiphany" – from the Greek epiphaneia – means "appearance" or "manifestation" of God, and shares roots with the word for sunrise or dawn. In ancient times, an epiphany meant either a visible manifestation of a god or the solemn visit of a ruler venerated as a god. For Christians, Christmas marks the coming of God to us; Epiphany celebrates the appearance of the Lord in the midst of all humanity. For many, this has been a time to reflect on what we will offer of ourselves to God as followers of Jesus this new year of 2018.

Last year people picked up Epiphany star words at worship. These included words such as "discovery," "forgiveness," "vigilance," "zeal," "confession," "examination," "heart," "lenience," and "grace" – but to name a few. Mine was "graciousness." I invite you to dust off your 2017 word and to reflect on how it may have shaped or informed your year. In worship on January 7 you will receive a new word. If you're not in worship you can get one from the ushers in the coming weeks. Let us – as individuals and as a community – look for moments of God's light, for the *aha!* moments, for clarity as we seek to follow Jesus anew this season, this year.

Nominating Committee Begins Discernment of Elders and Deacons

In this Season of new beginnings, Old First Presbyterian Church, is truly blessed by its active members. We are the body of Christ and each of our members has a part to play as we follow the ways of Jesus. That means that you too have role here.

As the New Year arrives, it time again for us to nominate deacons and elders to serve on the board of deacons and the session, respectively. Deacons and elders constitute the skeleton of the body and give it its pulse.

Deacons and elders are chosen by the people. Our Book of Order says that "Elders should be persons of faith, dedication, and good judgment. Their manner of life should be a demonstration of the Christian gospel, both within the church and in the world." It furthers says that the office of deacon as set forth in Scripture is a ministry of "sympathy, witness, and service after the example of Jesus Christ. Persons of spiritual character, honest repute, of exemplary lives, brotherly and sisterly love, warm sympathies and sound judgment should be chosen for this office."

Would you please pray and think about who might be called to be a deacon and or an elder? The Nominating Committee needs your suggestions.

Please speak to the people you're considering and ask if they are willing to be nominated. Or you might speak to a member of the church and ask them to reflect on those you think might be called to serve. November Session Meeting Report

- There was a short discussion on the current Stewardship Campaign which will conclude with outreach to members who have not yet pledged.
- There was a brief verbal report on the Potrero Hill Neighborhood House (known as the NABE).
- Details of the recent San Francisco Presbytery Meeting were shared and a flyer presenting areas to serve as leaders and in Presbytery working groups was distributed. It was announced that the next Western Regional Presbytery meeting will be on December 13 at Covenant Presbyterian Church on Taravel Street.
- The Worship Committee said that liturgist slots for upcoming months next year will be filled starting in January.
- The Planning Committee reported that the PneuMatrix consulting contract with Reverend Kitchens began in November with the first of 10 meetings planned for a year, that the Old First Garage Corporation has extended the agreement with Express Parking, and that OFPC has signed and submitted the second support letter for the local neighborhood benefit district.
- The Operations Committee reported that there will be an audio update, new carpet in the Munro Room, lighting changes, wall patching, Room A upgrades, new office computers and grills for Sacramento Street windows.
- Community Building reported that the re-conceived pew cards are now in development, and a new members class is planned for early in the new year.
- The Mission Committee reported about work on a homeless meeting, our energetic and colorful Mission Fair, a benefit concert for Interfaith Welcome, and a Holiday Gift Drive for Larkin Street youth.

The Call for a Navigation Center in District 3

Our faith leads us to speak out and speak up for the rights of all God's people. Last month many of our members and neighbors took part in a community meeting about developing a Navigation Center for our homeless neighbors in District 3. This letter was written by our members and submitted earlier in December with seventy-three signatures in addition to Maggi's.

Mayor Lee, Supervisor Breed, Supervisor Peskin,

Old First Presbyterian Church has been active in the heart of San Francisco since 1849, and has worshiped at our current location on the corner of Van Ness and Sacramento Street since 1882. As a community of believers, we answer the call of Jesus Christ to help those less fortunate, for faith without good works is not faith at all (James 2:17). Old First has been involved with several prominent charities in the community including Faithful Fools and Larkin Street Youth Services, which both aim to change the lives of our homeless neighbors here in San Francisco.

In the last year, we have seen an increase in the visibility of the homeless population in the middle Polk corridor. Many new faces have begun calling our neighborhood home. Some have been sleeping in tents, some under tarps, and others with no shelter but piece of cardboard between themselves and the concrete. We have seen some encampments set up and later dispersed by the city, only for the same homeless neighbors to return a few weeks later. There is simply no place for them to go.

For this reason, we at Old First are in strong support of the navigation centers that we have seen utilized in other districts. The navigation centers do more than just provide shelter for their inhabitants: they provide career counseling, addiction specialists, and social workers in a synergistic approach to help people get off the street for good. We understand that initial results have shown a high success rate, with nearly 80% finding permanent housing or utilizing the homeward bound program to return to family members in another city.

At a community forum held in November (attended by over 200 residents) Supervisor Peskin asked if he had our support to bring a navigation center to District 3, and was answered with loud applause. We too at Old First wish to applaud this idea. We are asking all of you – Mayor Lee and Supervisor Breed, as well as our own Supervisor Peskin – to work together to bring a navigation center to our district as soon as possible.

Through this expanded service we can ensure that seniors and guests with disabilities receive clothes necessary for their safety, comfort and dignity.
