A Season of Discernment

Have you ever wondered why Christians sometimes just cannot get along with each other?

Why are we so intolerant of each other's views when we are supposed to follow Christ, who told us to love one another?

The Presbyterian Church USA is trying another way—and we (the San Francisco Presbytery and Old First Church) are right in the middle of it!

In 2001 the PCUSA, recognizing the conflict arising from several issues including the ordination of gays and lesbians, formed The Theological Task Force on Peace, Unity, and Purity (PUP) of the Church to lead the church in spiritual discernment of our Christian identity. The Task Force finished its report in August 2005, and the 2006 General Assembly approved both the report and its recommended Authoritative Interpretation that reinforces the traditional Presbyterian concept that sessions and presbyteries are responsible for upholding ordination standards in the light of their knowledge of candidates.

Lisa Larges, a candidate under care of this Presbytery (a person called by God to become Minister of Word and Sacrament), asked to be certified ready to be ordained by the Committee on Preparation for the Ministry. The Committee after much discussion and discernment has certified her (by a split vote) as ready to be ordained with a declared departure. This decision, which will be closely watched by Presbyterians across the country, will be voted on by the Presbytery on January 15.

Our January adult education classes will discuss these timely issues at a critical juncture of our church's history.

New Session Structure Task Force at Work

It has been 16 years since we set the size of the Session and the Board of Deacons at 21 members each and organized the Session into ten committees to look after the work of Old First. A lot has changed since then. Our membership today is about 70 (27%) less than it was in 1992 and the pressures on our time have increased in ways we could not have anticipated.

In the last few years, it has been difficult for the Nominating Committee to identify enough people to fill out the Session and Board of Deacons, so these bodies have been operating with fewer members. This has meant that the elders and deacons on these bodies had to carry more of a load than was anticipated.

The Mission Vision report recognized these and other changes and recommended that a task force be formed to recommend changes to the size of the Session and Board of Deacons and the structure of the Session. If the size and structure are changed, then the Bylaws and Standing Rules of Old First will need to be changed.

In November, the Session chartered a new task force to make recommendations about the size of the Session and Board of Deacons and about how the Session organizes itself. This task force will also look into ways to improve the communication and collaboration processes involving pastor, elders, deacons and congregation.

In the next few months this task force will gather impressions and ideas from Old First members and will learn how other churches in the Presbytery are organized, particularly those about the size of Old First. For example, we will want to learn how smaller Sessions organize their work, and we will explore the effectiveness of alternatives to committees. That is, we would like to learn how work can be done without forming a committee to do it or, if we decide to continue with committees, learn how we can make the committee experience more enjoyable.

We also want to talk with members who have declined to be nominated to elder or deacon so we can understand what changes might be possible that would lead people to be excited about serving in these important positions.

If you have any ideas about how we can improve in any of these areas or would like to be interviewed by members of the task force, please feel free to talk with any of the task force members listed below. If you know of any other church that has a remarkably effective Session (or other organization with an effective board of directors) and from which we could learn a lot, please let us know that as well. We want to learn from the experiences of others.

You will note that Maggi is not listed as a task force member. Rest assured that she is actively involved and has a great interest in the outcome. But at this time in her ministry, she does not need to be on another committee!
